INTRODUCTION

WHAT IS THE GEORGIA TECH ALUMNI ADMISSIONS PROGRAM?

Thank you for becoming a part of the Georgia Tech Alumni Admissions Program (GTAAP). Your efforts this year will provide an important link between prospective students all over the country and the Georgia Tech campus. GTAAP is a voluntary program involving Georgia Tech alumni and parents in the recruitment of prospective students. The Georgia Tech Alumni Association and the Office of Undergraduate Admission jointly support this program and its volunteers.

As an alumna of Georgia Tech or the parent of a Georgia Tech student, you are able to offer a unique and valuable perspective to prospective students. Your role as a student recruiter provides a vital component: adding a much needed *personal touch* to the college admissions process.

As Georgia Tech's priorities change, we have shifted the main focus of the GTAAP program. In the past, GTAAP focused on getting the word out at college fairs and encouraging students to apply to Georgia Tech. As Georgia Tech continues to increase in reputation and prestige, as evidenced by the 5% increase in applications for 2011, we are now turning our focus to encouraging admitted students to enroll. Through the GTAAP program, we hope to increase Georgia Tech's *yield*: the percentage of admitted students who ultimately enroll at Georgia Tech. To that end, your personal interaction with talented students across the country is much needed to communicate the pride of the Georgia Tech community and the value of a Tech degree.

This training manual is the first component of your GTAAP training. After looking over the information provided, we also ask you take the short online quiz and enter your personal information to become a part of the GTAAP program. Once you have signed up online, you will be entered into our volunteer database and called upon for recruiting activities. Please take time to review the handbook and keep it handy for future reference. The goals of this manual are to:

- Familiarize you with the goals and activities of GTAAP.
- Educate you on the talking points of Georgia Tech.
- Provide a resource to help you answer prospective students' questions.

We hope you will find your volunteer activities with the program fun and rewarding. Georgia Tech is grateful for your service and we look forward to working with you in the coming year.

ADMITTED STUDENT PHONE CALL AND EMAIL CAMPAIGN

One of the most important ways you can assist Georgia Tech is by personalizing the Admissions process and making admitted students feel welcome and excited about Georgia Tech. These talented students have many options. Your encouragement, support, and interest in admitted students will help Georgia Tech stand out in the crowd!

GTAAP participants will be asked to make congratulatory phone calls or send emails (however the volunteer feels most comfortable communicating) to admitted students in your local area or in your broader geographic region. The purpose of the call or email is to welcome the student to Georgia Tech, share your personal experience, and encourage the student to attend.

This is a new activity that we hope will help to increase *yield*. Calls and emails will take place between mid-January and mid-April. Upon being asked to make phone calls or send emails, GTAAP participants will be assigned a list of five prospective students to reach out to. Volunteers will be provided with students' contact information and important talking points.

After the calls or emails are complete, we ask each volunteer to fill out the feedback form online at gtalumni.org/studentrecruiting. If the student has a question or concern that requires follow-up from Georgia Tech, please note this on the form and someone from the Office of Undergraduate Admission will contact him/her.

ADMITTED STUDENT EVENTS

Each spring, admitted students and their families are invited to gatherings hosted by alumni or parents in the local area. These informal "Meet and Greets" are held during the month of April, prior to the national college decision deadline of May 1. The purpose of the gathering is to introduce the students to the local Tech community, make them feel welcome, and encourage them to choose Tech. This is another important activity in our effort to increase *yield*. Often this is the final recruiting effort in communities across the country and is an opportunity to reach out to students who have not yet decided which college they will attend. Local alumni and current parents are able to offer a valuable perspective to accepted students and their parents.

The Office of Undergraduate Admission targets certain geographic areas each year and will approach the local GTAAP volunteers for assistance in hosting or attending the event. Locations are selected based on such factors as historic response, perceived interest, and budget. All alumni and current parents attending the event must be trained members of GTAAP.

The gatherings should be very casual and friendly. We recommend the events be held on a Sunday afternoon during the month of April, in a private home, where attendees can mix and mingle. There is no need for a presentation at these events, as Georgia Tech prefers they remain informal and focus on personal interaction with the admitted students.

COLLEGE FAIRS

A college fair is an event organized and sponsored by a high school, a school district, or a professional education association. College Fairs are programs designed to introduce high school students to many different college opportunities. Students and parents browse from table to table, ask questions, and pick up literature. This may be the first opportunity for prospective students and their parents to receive information about Georgia Tech.

Members of GTAAP living in geographic areas considered *high priority* for Admissions, with potential for growth in application numbers, may be asked to represent Georgia Tech at college fairs either with or without a representative from the Office of Undergraduate Admission. If there is a college fair in your area that needs coverage, you will be contacted by the Alumni Association or the Admissions Office.

If you are able to attend the college fair, a representative from Admissions will contact you with the details of the fair and will ship a box with all that you need to successfully represent Tech at the fair: admission materials, table décor, and training materials. Please review the materials in your box prior to the fair.

When attending a fair, please arrive 30 minutes prior to the start of the event to set up your table. Once the fair begins, greet prospective students and parents, answer questions about Tech using the information provided, pass out brochures, and collect the contact cards from interested students. If a student has a question you are unable to answer, it's ok to say "I don't know". Please refer the student to the Office of Undergraduate Admission at www.admission.gatech.edu or to one of the websites listed in the FAQ's of this handbook. Please remain at your table for the duration of the fair. After the fair, please return the contact cards in the envelope provided and fill out the online college fair evaluation form at <https://gtalumni.org/registrations/collegefairevaluation/responses/new>.

STUDENT REFERRALS

As the "eyes and ears" of the Admissions Office, you are in a unique position to identify potential Yellow Jackets from your community. They might be the sons or daughters of co-workers, or the young women or men that you coached on sports teams. They might be the students you whose names were just in the newspaper for making Honor Roll, winning a sports award, or for being involved in a community service project. Whatever your source, if you think they would make a positive addition to Georgia Tech, please let us know!

If you know of an exceptional student in grade 9-12, talk to them about the benefits of a Georgia Tech education. Encourage them to research Tech and visit the campus. Encourage students sign up for more information on the Admissions website: www.admission.gatech.edu/gtinfo. This will guarantee that the Office of Undergraduate Admission will have the student's information and will contact him/her with more information about Georgia Tech.

STUDENT RECRUITING ETIQUETTE

Please keep these in mind when interacting with prospective students

DO:

- Be friendly, professional, positive, and enthusiastic! You are a representative of Georgia Tech.
- Read your Alumni and Parent publications regularly (*Alumni Magazine*, *BUZZwords*, *ParentNews*) to stay up to date on current events.
- Use this handbook and the Georgia Tech Admissions website (www.admission.gatech.edu) as a resource for answering questions.
- Encourage visitation to campus. Visits can be scheduled on-line at www.visits.gatech.edu.
- Be aware of NCAA rules when speaking to students interested in playing athletics. It is best to allow the coaches to contact potential athletes.
- Contact the GTAAP staff before attending any recruiting event. All recruiters **must** complete the GTAAP training and all events **must** be approved by the Alumni Association and the Office of Undergraduate Admission.
- Recognize that it's ok to say "I don't know." If you don't know the answer to a student's question, offer to get an answer and follow up with the student, or direct him/her to one of the websites listed in this manual.

DON'T:

- Comment on a student's chance of being admitted. Decision-making is the domain of the professional admissions staff and involves many different and complex criteria.
- Make financial aid evaluations. Circumstances differ, even in cases of similar family income.
- Answer questions about which you are uncertain - offer to get an answer and follow-up with the student.
- Make comparisons between schools, as this does not reflect well on Georgia Tech. Speak of Tech's positive opportunities rather than emphasizing your perceptions of another institution's negative features.
- Use certain phrases that reflect negatively upon the Georgia Tech experience: Phrases such as "Getting out" or "Look to your left, Look to your right..." are a part of Georgia Tech's history. However, these phrases do not reflect the supportive environment students experience at Georgia Tech today and are not appropriate in a **recruiting** setting. Please emphasize that the retention rate for freshman at Tech is now 94%, with many graduating in 4 or 5 years.

WHAT SETS GEORGIA TECH APART?

Key factors to emphasize when speaking with prospective students

1. ACADEMIC POWERHOUSE - Georgia Tech is nationally recognized for its academic strength. Georgia Tech is consistently ranked in U.S. News & World Report's top ten for public universities in the United States.

2. COMPETITIVE ADVANTAGE - Because of Georgia Tech's reputation for excellence, graduates have a competitive advantage when it comes to landing that first job, attending the top graduate schools, and building a successful lifetime career.

3. LIVING WHILE LEARNING - Tech students embrace life outside of the classroom. From competitive intercollegiate sports, to a nationally ranked Campus Recreation Center, to more than 350 student organizations, opportunities for fun, camaraderie, and leadership are plentiful.

4. REAL WORLD CONTRIBUTIONS - At Georgia Tech, there is a strong emphasis on preparation for the workplace. The Co-Op and Internship Programs give students an early opportunity to experience and contribute in the working world.

5. ATLANTA! - Georgia Tech's campus occupies 400 acres in the heart of the city of Atlanta. The international city of Atlanta offers professional opportunities, cultural entertainment, festivals, sporting events, concerts, and much more.

6. GLOBAL VIEWS - Study abroad is very popular at Georgia Tech. Tech offers more than 65 exchange programs and twenty group faculty-led programs, sending more than 1000 students abroad each year. The International Plan Program prepares students to compete effectively in the global marketplace.

7. HOTBED OF TECHNOLOGY - Tech helps students master the leading role that technology plays in every field-from science, engineering, to liberal arts, business, and architecture. Students at Tech have an opportunity to study and research in areas such as video game design, cancer treatment, digital media, and spacecraft design, just to name a few.

8. GREAT VALUE - Tech is a great value. You can receive a top-notch education at a competitive cost. Georgia Tech was voted #3 best value college by SmartMoney Magazine.

9. FUTURISTIC DISCOVERIES - Georgia Tech makes it possible for students to participate in high-profile research on topics that will better our world. Students partner with faculty who are among the best in their fields to work toward important discoveries in rapidly growing areas like bioengineering, computing, international affairs, and biochemistry.

10. ORIGINAL THINKING - Tech celebrates original thought and innovation. Students share a common intellectual curiosity and are encouraged to develop in ways that are new and uniquely their own. For example, the Inventure Prize supports student innovation.

ADMISSIONS FAQ'S

Below are some questions commonly asked by prospective students and parents. **Remember, it's ok to say "I don't know!"** If you do not know an answer to a question, try to refer the student to one of the websites listed in this handbook or the Admissions website where they will find links to many campus departments and a searchable database of Frequently Asked Questions (www.admission.gatech.edu). Students may also call and speak with an Admissions Counselor at 404.894.4154.

WHAT DOES GEORGIA TECH LOOK FOR IN STUDENTS?

Georgia Tech evaluates four primary components of an applicant's background, in order to make an admission decision. Those four areas are: 1. Weighted GPA/Rigor of Curriculum, 2. SAT/ACT scores, 3. Leadership and Activity Record (extra-curricular involvement) and 4. Personal Essay. These criteria are all critical to being competitive for admission to Georgia Tech. IS THERE A MINIMUM GPA OR SAT/ACT SCORE REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION?

Georgia Tech does not set a minimum GPA or SAT/ACT score to be considered for admission. Competitive ranges are listed below (middle 50%):

SAT 1940-2160

ACT 28-32

ADMISSIONS FAQ'S

WHAT IS THE COST OF ATTENDING GEORGIA TECH?

The figures listed below are unofficial estimates. The amount of Georgia Tech's Tuition is set by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia.

GEORGIA RESIDENT:	\$21,098
NON-GEORGIA RESIDENT:	\$39,308

This is a per year estimate including tuition, miscellaneous fees, books and supplies, room and board, and personal expenses. These figures do not take the Hope Scholarship or other financial aid into consideration.

HOW DO I APPLY TO GEORGIA TECH?

- 1) Complete the online application
- 2) Submit the \$65 application fee (online)
- 3) Contact SAT and/or ACT to have your official test scores sent to GT

HOW DO I APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID?

Freshman applicants must submit two forms in order to be considered for Financial Aid. Both forms are due by March 1:

- 1) FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) – www.fafsa.ed.gov
- 2) Georgia Tech Application for Scholarships and Financial Aid – www.finaid.gatech.edu/apply

To be considered for financial aid, both of these forms must be submitted on time (even if the student has not yet received an admission decision from Georgia Tech).

Please note: It is very important that you do not attempt to make any assessment of a student's potential for financial aid. Please direct all questions to the Office of Student Scholarships and Financial Aid at 404-894-4160 or www.finaid.gatech.edu. **If your local alumni club offers a scholarship, please promote the scholarship and let students know how to apply.**

WHAT IS THE PRESIDENT'S SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM?

This is the premier merit-based scholarship from Georgia Tech. The President's Scholars Program seeks outstanding students who excel in academics and leadership. The scholarship is offered at several levels up to the full cost of attendance, including out-of-state tuition, room, board, and fees. The scholarship is renewable for a total of four academic years. Other benefits include early registration for housing, study abroad stipends, and special trips designed to enhance students' experience at Georgia Tech.

There is no separate application for the President's Scholarship. Candidates will be selected by evaluation of the applications for freshman admission submitted online by **November 1**. Students selected for the semifinal round will be notified by December 15 and will be asked to submit further evaluations. Finalists will participate in a final interview on campus in the spring. ADMISSIONS FAQ'S

ARE THERE CO-OP OR INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITIES AT GEORGIA TECH?

More than 3,000 Georgia Tech students currently participate in the Co-Op and Internship Programs, all of which are voluntary. Co-op students and interns are employed by more than 1,000 businesses and organizations, worldwide – ranging from small privately owned enterprises to major multi-national corporations and governmental agencies. This is an excellent way for students to help finance their Georgia Tech Education. Students do not pay tuition during Co-Op or Internships and will be paid for their work. CAN I PARTICIPATE IN RESEARCH AS AN UNDERGRADUATE AT GEORGIA TECH?

Undergraduate participation in research is a priority at Georgia Tech. The Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program (UROP) is designed to facilitate and encourage opportunities for undergraduate students to participate in research during their tenure at Georgia Tech. ARE ADVANCED PLACEMENT, INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE, OR COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSES TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT IN THE ADMISSIONS PROCESS?

Enrollment in AP, IB, or college-level courses is a factor in the admissions process, when considering rigor of curriculum. Georgia Tech recalculates each applicant's GPA using a standard 4.0 grading scale. For students taking AP, IB, or college-level courses, an additional one-half (0.5) point is added to the GPA.

WHAT IS ORIENTATION LIKE?

FASET Orientation is a Georgia Tech tradition since 1972. An orientation program for new students, the program is offered at the start of each semester. During orientation new students will receive academic advisement and register for their courses. New students and their guests will hear from various campus services, student organizations, and Georgia Tech administrators on a variety of social, business and academic components. WHAT IS THE FRESHMAN EXPERIENCE?

The Freshman Experience is a voluntary living option to help freshman get started on the right path at Georgia Tech. Freshman Experience students live, eat, and learn together. WHAT KIND OF EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES ARE AVAILABLE?

Georgia Tech offers over 400 student organizations, including, but not limited to athletic, civic, social, cultural and religious organizations. DOES GEORGIA TECH OFFER PRE-PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS?

Georgia Tech offers pre-professional advisement to assist students interested in further study in **medical, dental, pharmacy, veterinary, and law schools or a career in teaching**. Georgia Tech's approach provides students with an individual program to suit their needs.

DOES GEORGIA TECH OFFER STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS?

DOES GEORGIA TECH HAVE AN HONORS PROGRAM? HOW CAN I APPLY?

This will be the sixth year of the Georgia Tech Honors Program, which has been a great success.
